PATIENT'S UPDATED ROUTINE

- 1. Morning:** use the current printed labels; check off doses on the one-week medicine card.
- 2. Evening meal:** keep metformin with the dinner routine, exactly as its current label states.
- 3. Night:** place the atorvastatin reminder beside the toothbrush and keep latanoprost on the bedside checklist.
- 4. Twice-daily medicine:** use two separate checklist boxes; never combine missed and current doses.
5. Carry the corrected wallet list dated 04/18/27 and replace older copies.

New bruising, repeated nosebleed, blood noticed in urine/stool, or a fall without severe symptoms	Call the prescribing team the same day; do not wait for the next review	Cardiology 555-0443; after hours 555-0525
Severe or uncontrolled bleeding, coughing/vomiting blood, fainting, sudden severe headache, new weakness, or trouble speaking	Emergency action — call 911. Do not drive yourself.	911
